



A Focus on Community Engagement And Stakeholder Alignment

Last year was a year of leadership transition for Indiana Black Expo. Alice Watson, IBE's President & CEO, spent a significant amount of time traveling across the state and meeting with IBE's chapter presidents and community leaders in Anderson, Muncie, Kokomo, Fort Wayne, Lafayette, Michigan City, East Chicago, Gary, Elkhart, South Bend, Evansville, and Indianapolis. President Watson also met with numerous stakeholders, community partners and funders to gather valuable information to ensure IBE's strategies and goals are in line with their needs and expectations and to further develop a network of support to help IBE achieve its goals. Black Business Training Institute

Eighty-nine small Black business owners from Central Indiana participated in IBE's Back Business Training Institute's spring and fall cohorts. Those businesses received training in the following areas: Business Development and Planning, Financial Management, Operational Management, Marketing and Branding, Technology, Doing Business with the Public and Private Sector, and Access to Capital. Of the 89 participants, 97% completed their business plan before graduating from the program.

As part of IBE's Black Business of the Month initiative, BBTI graduates were highlighted on our social media pages, and their profiles were highlighted on LinkedIn to increase their visibility and highlight their successes.



IBE's Business Conference presented by Delta Faucet took place in the Indiana Convention Center and workshop presenters and expert panelists shared business opportunities and diversity initiatives within Central Indiana, universities, and state and federal agencies. Business experts and financial representatives provide strategies for growing and sustaining businesses through obtaining financial resources and longterm planning strategies to 535 attendees. The sessions covered the following topics: City of Indianapolis - Project Pipeline - 2024 Opportunities and Beyond; Fueling Your Growth: Strategies for Accessing Capital; So, You Want to Be Drafted? Doing Business with Professional Sports Teams; Opportunities to Grow Your Business in Underutilized Hud Zones; Business Diversity Strategies and Opportunities in Indiana's Higher Education Institutions; When Preparation Meets Opportunity: Doing Business with the State; and Breaking Borders: Navigating the Global Business Landscape. Attendees of the conference rated it a 4.9 out of 5.0.



Last year, 98 youth participated in The Performing Arts Academy (PAA) where they received high-quality performing arts training in dance, photography, music production, acting, and videography in addition to academic and social supports.

IBE expanded its partnership with the Indianapolis Motor Speedway. The PAA students and their families were invited to the IMS in the Spring and Fall. A total of 42 students shadowed industry professionals and learned how IMS Production is executed on race day, gaining exposure to technical skills useful in various industries, including film, television, and digital media. Additional experiences for the students and their families consisted of tours of the property, racing staff meet and greets, and the opportunity to watch and cheer on Force Indy, the first African American racing team local to Indianapolis.

Throughout the year, students participated in financial literacy workshops and worked in collaboration on multimedia projects leading up to PAA on Location inside the Indiana Convention Center that consisted of dance competitions, an onsite acting studio, DJ station, and journalist booth. 2023 culminated with the PAA Showcase that highlighted the skills and talents developed over the year. Students from dance, photography, and videography performed and captured content that will be used for various Indiana Black Expo marketing collateral.

Education Day

Coronation

Last year, 11 high school students participated in the Circle City Classic® Coronation. Prior to the Coronation attended by 400 people, participants attended workshops over a 12-week period that focused on the importance of teamwork, leadership styles, college admissions requirements, study skills, effective communication (oral and written), dress for success, social etiquette, college financial aid, and modern dance. In addition to the workshops, the participants spent hours on mental health education, participated in an HBCU Panel, health and fitness workshops, public speaking, and stage presence. Nia Mitchell was named Miss Circle City Classic®, the 1st runner-up was Kelsi Edwards and the 2nd runner-up was Kristian Austin. All three finalists received college scholarships totaling \$10,000.

IBE believes it is important for our community to feel a sense of belonging for their mental and emotional well-being and for social cohesion, economic growth, and combating systemic racism. Our nationally known events are designed to provide our communities with a sense of belonging and to elevate their voice. Approximately 297,322 people attended Summer Celebration and Circle City Classic, two nationally known events that celebrate Black culture. Approximately 1,844 volunteers participated in IBE's programming, 1031 members joined IBE chapters across the state of Indiana and 65 events and programs were planned and executed by IBE staff and volunteers.

Summer Celebration

Summer Celebration, Indiana Black Expo's largest event that showcases Black Culture in Indiana, attracted 157,567 attendees in July. The celebration included the Indiana Black & Minority Health Fair, All White Affair presented by Pacers Sports & Entertainment, Business Conference presented by Delta Faucet, Mayor's Breakfast presented by Delta Faucet, Governor's Awards Reception, Policy Summit, Cultural Arts Pavilion, Ecumenical Service, Indiana Convention Center Exhibits, Music Heritage Festival, Pacers Sports & Entertainment Corporate Luncheon presented by Indiana University, Education Conference presented by Indiana University, Sponsor Appreciation Reception, Amateur Boxing, Art Speaks Café, and Youth Leadership Summit presented by Purdue University.



A Sense of Belonging...

At this year's Pacers Sports & Entertainment Corporate Luncheon presented by Indiana University, Jim Irsay, owner of the Indianapolis Colts, announced a generous donation of \$1 million dollars to IBE. The funds will be used to advance our programming and increase capacity of the organization as set forth in our 5-year strategic plan.

Circle City Classic®

Circle City Classic® is a weekend event in September that showcases the spirit and energy of historically black colleges and universities while providing scholarships to Indiana students. Last year, the event attracted 109,205 attendees. The weekend included a Praise & Worship Service, Tailgate/Fan Fest, Parade, Education Day, Pep Rally, Business & Entrepreneurship Day Party, Talent Day, Coaches Luncheon presented by NCAA, HBCU Football Game and Battle of the Bands.

Volunteer Appreciation

Our volunteers are essential to the success of our events and programs. We prioritize their training and development to ensure they have the skills to play an integral role in our year-round programs and events. Our partnership with Visit Indy has enabled us to provide comprehensive training to our volunteers to empower them to deliver exceptional hospitality services and experiences.

To acknowledge their contribution and thank our volunteers for their commitment to the organization, IBE hosted a Volunteer Appreciation Reception where we recognized individuals for their outstanding leadership and hard work and presented them with the Chairperson of the Year and Golden Volunteer awards. We extend our gratitude to our community partners, including Carrier, OneAmerica, the Indianapolis Department of Public Works, and The National Black Nurses Association of Indianapolis for their volunteer services.



Health Equity & Justice

African Americans account for 41% of premature deaths. One of our key areas of focus is health equity. African Americans often face significant health disparities because of historical and systemic factors such as racial segregation, discrimination, and unequal access to healthcare services. As a result, African Americans are more likely to suffer from chronic diseases and have shorter life expectancies. One of the ways that IBE tries to help improve health outcomes for our community is through our partnership with the Indiana State Department of Health (ISDH) on the Health Fair and our Tobacco Prevention and Cessation Initiative.

Indiana Black & Minority Health Fair

The goal of the Indiana Black & Minority Health Fair is to increase awareness of chronic diseases, such as diabetes, heart disease, stroke, hypertension and cancer, and how to prevent them. Last year, 96 health exhibitors and 13,294 people participated in the health fair administered by ISDH. The free screenings were valued at \$4,000.





People Reached

Tobacco Prevention & Cessation Initiative

IBE has been a champion and advocate for promoting racial health equity for over 53 years. We aim to increase access and awareness to health issues in the African American community. To combat tobacco use and health disparities disproportionately affecting the African American community, IBE works with partners such as the Indiana Minority Health Coalition, Marion County Public Health Department, Indianapolis Urban League, and the American Lung Association. IBE utilizes its statewide infrastructure and network to implement a health campaign, provide outreach, educate youth and adults on the dangers of tobacco, and advocate for policy-focused interventions through the African American Coalition Against Tobacco coalition partnerships. At IBE's 29th Statewide Conference, we held a panel discussion titled Clearing the Air: Empowering Communities to Say No to Tobacco.

Commercial tobacco use is the number one cause of preventable death among African Americans, claiming 45,000 Black lives every year. IBE has advocated for a ban on menthol cigarettes. Last year, in partnership with churches in Indianapolis, Elkhart, and South Bend, IBE celebrated No Menthol Sunday on May 21st in support of a ban on menthol and other flavored tobacco products. IBE reached over 5,500 people through physical and online congregation attendance.



IBE Chapters

IBE Chapters play a critical role in ensuring that IBE's mission is delivered throughout the state of Indiana. Each chapter hosts programs and initiatives that align with the needs of their communities.

IBE Statewide Leadership Training

In April, IBE hosted its statewide Chapter Leadership Training in Indianapolis and trained 60 chapter leaders and members. The outcomes from the training include coalition building, advocacy, and community engagement. IBE Board leadership facilitated workshops on Board Development for Your Chapter, Chapter Member Recruitment, and Understanding the Difference between Event and Program Implementation. Other workshops included Accessing Your Community Needs, Financial Reporting, Diverse Recruitment and Retaining Members, Indiana Civil Rights Commission Fair Housing Update, Outward Inclusion- An Outward Approach to Diversity, Equity, Inclusion & Belonging, and 3 Keys to Attract Strategic Partners to Rapidly Grow Your Organization.

The aim of the workshops are to inspire members to take the information they receive back to their local chapters and implement and expand their chapter work in their respective communities.

The Elkhart Chapter was named the 2023 Indiana Black Expo Chapter of the Year for the impact they made in their local community due to numerous community programs and engagement activities.
